



Notes on Today's Music

from MITCHELL CRAWFORD

Issues of gender and sexuality are emergent among those of prominence for the theologically progressive. The rapid sea-change in public opinion on (especially) marriage equality has been a bridge to areas that long existed at the margins of public awareness. At a broad, societal level, we are only beginning to grapple with their implications: the "public restroom" dog-whistle used by conservatives to pass restrictive laws targeting the transgender community is a potent example of the extent to which such groups are easily demonized for political gain. Similarly, ignorance and prejudice often reinforce harmful stereotypes which must be counterbalanced if equality is ultimately to prevail.

Into this breach have stepped a number of individuals concerned with the church's song — writers of hymns who have sought to craft texts fostering inclusion and understanding simultaneously; texts that call us to be mindful of the infinite dimensions of our ever-creating, still speaking God within this specific context. Foremost among these is **The Rev. Dr. Carl P. Daw** of the **Boston University School of Theology**, whose areas of interest have long included the concept of "the holy other":

Human otherness (of whatever kind) provides a sacramental reminder of the ultimate otherness of God, and openness to human otherness has the potential to enlarge our perception of and receptivity to divine otherness. It is also an essential element of human maturity to recognize otherness, i.e. to know where the self ends and otherness begins, whether that otherness be other people or non-human objects. From a theological perspective, "otherness" is a necessary dimension of the movement from the disappointments of self-sufficiency to the assurances of trust in God.

Dr. Daw addresses the concept of "the other" directly in his hymn All the Colors of the Rainbow (2016) which, following an opening verse that suggests "the church reveals most beauty where diversity is real: breadth of race and class and gender, room for doubt and space to heal," offers this entreaty in conclusion (the melody is the same as for God Is Here, #70 in the New Century Hymnal):

Teach us, God, our need of others; through them, help us fully live. Wean us from our selfish habits; let us listen, learn, forgive. May we see your longed for image in each human heart and face, and behold how those around us can be channels of your grace.

Many contemporary authors have sought to characterize gender as neither fixed nor binary, but something malleable and fluid instead. Amy Cerniglia's hymn *God of Many Faces* (2019) finds in the panoply of human expression reflections of God the Creator (the melody is the same as for *Be Now My Vision*, #451 in the *New Century Hymnal*):

God of many genders, our world reflects you, sunrise and sunset uniting our hues, woven into a city with jewels of all shades, houses of ruby and walls rowed with jade.

and:

God of many bodies, abide within ours, shifting more each day through time and through scars. Come sanctify our bodies, all fashioned by you, holier everyday, still becoming more true.

Today's anthem, As Colors in the Sky (2016), is still another text which seeks in no uncertain terms to expand our Christian sense of gender and community. Its author **Daniel Charles Damon** (b. 1955) is pastor of First United Methodist Church, Richmond, California and Associate Editor of Hymnody for Hope Publishing Company. A writer of hymns on a variety of social justice themes, the Rev. Damon has long been an ally and supporter of those struggling for inclusion within the church.
