

Notes on Today's Music

Among the foremost of America's choral composers and arrangers, **Mack Wilberg** is Music Director of The Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square — commonly known as the Mormon Tabernacle Choir — in Salt Lake City, Utah. Part of his charge as Music Director includes “giving renewed vitality to well-loved hymns and folk tunes,” a task he has pursued with abandon throughout his tenure. For this reason, there exist many spectacular “*Mack Wilberg arrangements*” of any number of familiar hymns, often readily viewable online in reference recordings by the The Tabernacle Choir and Orchestra themselves. Ever an audience favorite, *Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing* is, incidentally, the third-most watched video on the choir's YouTube channel. Wilberg's arrangements, which are often characterized by a majestic grandeur befitting the enormous choral and instrumental forces available at the Salt Lake Tabernacle, have frequently been included during occasions of great notoriety: the dedication of the national World War II Memorial and state funerals of Presidents Ronald Reagan and Gerald Ford are just a few examples.

Beloved former Old South Minister of Music **Harry Huff** composed his setting of “O Master, Let Me Walk with Thee” in 1982 to honor the ordination of his friend, the Rev. Eugene Lowe, Jr. It is among the earliest of Harry's choral anthems, written while Calvin Hampton — Harry's mentor, colleague, and dear friend — was still alive. I note this as, occasionally, the stylistic influence of Hampton is evident, as in the melodic and harmonic contours of the second phrase (*Tell me your secret...*). Here also, then, is an opportunity to observe Harry (whom most of us remember as larger than life) in a more introspective idiom, as well as to experience his early musical style.

The morning's postlude, the chorale motet *Kyrie, Gott heiliger Geist*, is the last of three *Pedaliter* [“with pedal,” i.e. an organ work which includes a part for the feet] settings of the *Kyrie* found in the *Clavier-Übung III*, a monumental compendium of both free and chorale-based works regarded among **J. S. Bach's** most significant and extensive works for keyboard. The *Clavier-Übung* [“keyboard practice”], in addition to containing some of Bach's most musically complex compositions for the organ, is among the very few works published during the composer's lifetime. This fact alone is an indication of Bach's own assessment of its worth: engraving and printing was a costly and laborious task in the Baroque era, often reserved for the most superlative exemplars within any genre.

The *Kyrie* itself is constructed of a dense four-voice fugue in the manuals, the material for which is derived from the first two lines of the *cantus firmus* [melody, more or less], which is played in long notes by the feet. Such practice was hopelessly outmoded by the time Bach employed it; his fascination with — and perfection of — older styles of composition made Bach easily caricatured in his time as a dowdy figure more interested in the science of music than with its affect. But the low regard in which many of Bach's contemporaries held his compositions was a symptom merely of changing fashion; with hindsight, Bach has been revealed as the most important composer of Western music ever to have lived. The breadth of his accomplishment is so staggering as to be difficult even to summarize. Looking for a Lenten discipline? Consider meditating on the works of Sebastian Bach, whose birthday falls at the end of this month.
